Cardinal Dolan Dedicates State-of-the-Art Health and Wellness Center

As has become the norm in these times of COVID, a grand opening and dedication of a brand new Health and Wellness Center at Our Lady of Lourdes High School took place on Wednesday, February 10, 2021 via a livestream to the students and school community.

With honored guest Timothy Cardinal Dolan officiating, the new state-of-the-art facility was blessed, dedicated, and officially put into use for all students, faculty, and staff. Only a small gathering that included the school's board of trustees, benefactors, and administrators were present with the Cardinal during the ceremony while the entire student body and faculty watched the ceremonies via a livestream.

The plan to transform the north side of the school's campus was a long-term goal of Principal Catherine Merryman who assumed leadership of the school in 2014. This initiative provides a cutting-edge facility to the performing arts, physical education, and athletic components of the school with a complete renovation of 7,000 square feet of existing space. After months of planning that began pre-COVID, work began in July 2020 transforming the area creating a new athletic training facility that includes weight training machines, cardio equipment and strengthening spaces, a multi-use space for performing arts and physical education programs with a new dance/yoga studio, new locker rooms, and a media classroom for PE classes and athletic teams. The school worked with architects from Liscum McCormack VanVoorhis LLP and Mid-Hudson Construction Management on the project.

According to Principal Merryman, "This new wellness center represents a final phase that has created a completely upgraded infrastructure for the school's Physical Education, Athletic, and Arts Education programs benefiting the entire Lourdes community and serving the needs of all students, faculty, and staff. Providing for all students was considered in this much-needed upgrade and will be available for use by all in our building." The school credits its benefactors that include the Archdiocese of NY and the James J. McCann Charitable Trust along with other dedicated and loyal donors in making this project possible. Merryman comments, "The support of the Archdiocese and the McCann Trust is paramount for our students and only strengthens our place as a leading Catholic High School for our region. We have a strong future at Our Lady of Lourdes. Despite the challenges of this past year, we






have managed to defy the odds. When schools shut down in March 2020 due to COVID, our academic and instructional plan put us ahead of the curve in transitioning to online learning in a matter of days, and in September, we opened our doors in time for the start of the school year.

Established in 1958, the school moved to its current Boardman Road campus in 1996. In 2012, the school launched a \$3 million Capital Campaign that built the James J. McCann Athletic Facility providing a "home field" to Lourdes students for the first time in the school's then 55 year history. "I venture to state that this new wellness center is unlike any of its kind in high schools in our region," said Principal Merryman, "and will only further enrich our student experience."

Lourdes Welcomes Faculty and Students Back to Campus

With most local school districts delaying their reopening plans, Our Lady of Lourdes High School opened its doors in September 2020 to begin the 2020-2021 school year.

It is through tools such as Canvas Learning Management, GoGuardian, Loom, PlayPosit, and Labster that teachers have the ability to keep track of student progress.Lourdes teachers have been using these tools for years, which allowed them to quickly and smoothly move their classes online.

Happy about returning, John Herles from the Lourdes Science Department commented, "It's great to be back in the classroom for live instruction. We have been implementing online resources over the last several years that make in-person and remote instruction seamless and effective. Having an online learning platform like Canvas, and a virtual lab program like Labster enables our lessons to continue to be dynamic and engaging while still meeting safety standards."

Priscilla Gateson, a Lourdes Mathematics teacher agrees stating, "I am excited to be back to help build relationships with students as well as having a sense of normalcy back in my life. I feel as though OLL has set teachers and students up for success by providing us with all the technology we need to handle live streaming and remote learning. I am looking forward to expanding my teaching styles and technology knowledge."

The intention to reopen the school last fall was forefront in the minds of the Lourdes administration with planning that began as early as April 2020. From the sanitizing of the building and renovation of certain areas to upgrading necessary technology for synchronous teaching and learning, adding signage for promoting all precautions as they relate to the standards set by CDC, DOH, and NYSED the focus since Spring 2020 was to be prepared to follow the guidelines and continue to offer our community academic excellence, rigor, and enrichment. This all took place throughout the spring and summer and the school submitted its reopening plan to NY State on July 30th.

When Governor Cuomo announced on August 7th that schools could open according to their approved plans Lourdes moved forward with their synchronous instructional model that offered a choice of fully remote or hybrid consisting of two cohorts of students attending in-person instruction on alternating days.

Lourdes Director of Technology, Matthias Johnson installed widescreen TVs in classrooms to replace smart boards and projectors. "These allow for increased viewing of presentations as we maximize the space for desks in each classroom, states Johnson. "All students are issued Chromebooks for use whether in-school or remote learning."

"In addition, our faculty are teaching in a paperless environment," comments Meghan Vilardo, Assistant Principal. "Many of our faculty were included in the preparation of our reopening plan and have received the necessary resources and training they needed to move forward in this unprecedented time."

Approximately half of the student body are in the building each day. Families had the option to choose remote or in-school instruction for their students and early on only 13% of the student body chose to attend remotely. Regardless of their choice, all faculty livestream their classes and students are required to attend each class

whether remote or in the classroom. Through the use of GoGuardian, synchronous learning is possible each and every day.

Lourdes faculty member Lauren Katz of the English Department was excited about returning to the school building, remarking, "As a faculty, we are thrilled to have the ability to see our students face-to-face so we can facilitate authentic learning experiences whether they are in class or at home. After the countless hours of dedication and work by the administration, faculty, and staff during the summer, we are now able to welcome our students in our building and create a sense of normalcy for them. With all of our technology platforms and devices, we are able to provide an even better learning experience for our students. Seeing our new freshman class in the building inspired hope that, as a community, our perseverance and faith will see us through this difficult time as we build a better future."

Her colleague, John Maggi from the Lourdes Social Studies Department reiterates Katz's remarks, stating, "I am looked forward to reconnecting with students while also collaborating with the rest of the faculty, administration, and support staff to exceed learners' academic, personal, and spiritual goals. I anticipated livestreaming and remote learning to be an important part of the toolbox for success. These student-centered approaches aim to enhance knowledge and foster growth. Our Lady of Lourdes High School is providing educators, students, and families with the resources to be successful today, tomorrow and for decades to come."

In this time that many colleges were struggling to remain open, Lourdes was optimistic. "We are confident that we had taken the necessary steps to provide a safe learning environment for our students, faculty, and staff," stated Catherine Merryman. "We had been and continued to be in constant communication with our families throughout this process. We hosted two Town Hall Meetings for families that outlined our plans and expectations asking them to partner with us in maintaining safety for all students. We were ready to work with all agencies to comply with the standards set by NYSDED and CDC."



Our Lady of Lourdes High School Ahead of the Curve with Online Learning

For the past six years, Our Lady of Lourdes High School understood the important part a Learning Management System (LMS) played in preparing students for college.

According to Principal, Catherine Merryman, "Our blended learning philosophy has pointed us in a direction that demanded we provide our students with state-of-theart technological resources which includes a one-to-one student Chromebook program & SMS. This academic and instructional plan put us ahead of the curve in transitioning to online learning during these uncertain and confusing times."

On March 13, 2020 when Lourdes announced that the school building would close and shift to remote learning due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the Administration and Faculty set aside two days to prepare and plan for a smooth transition. Video conference meetings were carried out and the administration assured the faculty that they had their full support.

Mrs. Merryman remarks, "We had to close our building, but we knew that it was important that our school remained open with preparation and teaching continuing. Our preparation for flexible online learning demonstrates the value of Lourdes' Catholic education to our students, their parents and our community. We have a great administration and faculty that provides quality education in this time of crisis while continuing to share our faith."

It is through tools such as *Canvas Learning Management*, *GoGuardian*, *Loom*, *PlayPosit*, and *Labster* that teachers have the ability to keep track of student progress. Lourdes' teachers have been using these tools for years, which allowed them to quickly and smoothly move their classes online over a weekend.

Canvas LMS makes entire course content available including class notes, video lectures, assignments, & assessments, and parents can observe all interactions and track grades for specific assignments and monitor their students' progress. It also provides analytics that allows administrators and teachers the ability to monitor student engagement, analyze student learning outcomes and make instructional adjustments to enhance students' achievement. *GoGuardian* provides direct monitoring of students' screens during assigned class periods to ensure they are staying on task and maintains the integrity of work or testing being done on Chromebook.

Loom records lectures while displaying the teacher, their presentation screens, and digital annotations which provides an audio and visual experience that simulates the classroom.

PlayPosit allows engagement for visual learners with clear learning objectives/videos that pause for a check for understanding in the form of multiple-choice or free-response questions and allows the teacher to gather assessment data. With this data, teachers gain insight into which areas of their content might be difficult to follow allowing them to focus on clarification.

Finally, with *Labster* students are able to complete virtual science labs on their Chromebooks and have their results returned into the Canvas gradebook.

"Students need a multitude of resources available in order to be successful," comments Principal Merryman. "For most students, nothing substitutes for the teacher-to-student experience in the classroom but *Canvas*, *PlayPosit*, and *Loom* when utilized within the online learning module can effectively mimic an authentic classroom experience. It is obvious that remote instruction is different and has some disadvantages such as the lack of immediacy in being able to respond to a student's question, but there are also many advantages such as self-pacing which allows students to rewind instruction if they missed a detail and utilize tutorials and video lectures for repetition."

Lourdes' parents seem to agree. "We have been impressed with the way Lourdes transitioned to online learning. They all have done an outstanding job during this difficult time," remarks Jennifer Mullan, parent of a current junior at the school. Freshman parent, Amanda Zuidema agrees commenting, "We truly appreciate the speed in which the team turned around online learning and the constant communication to parents."

In addition, the students adapted rather quickly. "My kids completed their first day of distance learning with no confusion," states Jennifer Holup, parent of two freshmen students. "No questions like, 'What do I do?' 'How do I do this' etc. They knew exactly what to do from all of their teachers and were able to complete all of the day's assignments with no issues."

Thank you Father Connolly. Your presence is indeed felt throughout our school each and every day!










Father Connolly blesses the congregation at the start of Mass celebrating the Feast of Our Lady of Lourdes.

The formal announcement was made by the National Interscholastic Swim Coaches Association (NISCA) on Monday, July 6, 2020.


Michael earned this honor in March with his 3rd place finish in the 500 free with the

Brother Leo Shea FMS, former OLL President, Passes Away

It is with deep sadness that we share the passing of Brother Leo Shea, former President of Our Lady of Lourdes High School. Brother Leo Shea was instrumental in the move from the North Hamilton Street school location to our present campus on Boardman Road. He served as President of OLL from 1993 to 1995.

According to an obituary from the Marist Brothers Provincial Office, Brother Leo, a member of the Marist Brothers of the Schools for 68 years, died on June 3, 2020, at Champagnat Hall in the Bronx, NY. He was 85 years old.

Br. Leo became a postulant with the Marist Brothers in 1951 and entered the Marist Brothers Novitiate in 1952. He professed first vows in 1953, his perpetual vows in 1958, and the vow of stability in 1969.

Br. Leo Shea was universally loved and cherished by his fellow Marist Brothers, family members, colleagues, and former students. During his life as a Marist Brother, he was elected and served in Provincial leadership of the Marist Brothers' Esopus Province for many years. He also had an extraordinary career as a Marist educator, administrator, counselor, and teacher while serving at Marist High School (Bayonne, NJ), St. Joseph Academy (Brownsville, TX), John A. Coleman High School (Kingston, NY), Our Lady of Lourdes High School (Poughkeepsie, NY), and Bishop Carroll High School (Ebensburg, PA). Br. Leo was a founding member of the USA Marist Mission to Liberia, West Africa, and was the Founder of Guadalupe Regional Middle School, in Brownsville, TX.

Br. Leo was the son of Alfonso and Agnes (McCarthy) Shea. He is survived by many family members, including his many nieces and nephews, as well as his Marist Brothers of the Province of the United States. He was pre-deceased by his older brother, Cornelius, his older sister, Alice, and his younger brother, Joseph.

Due to COVID-19 restrictions, no funeral services were allowed to happen at the time of his death. A memorial Mass to celebrate his life was held at the Marist Brothers Center in Esopus on Friday, August 7th at 10:00 am, followed by the burial of his ashes in the Marist Brothers cemetery and a luncheon.


By means of your religious vows, you should strive to live fortitude in such a way that these effects will be manifested in your soul.

For nearly three decades of Our Lady of Lourdes High School graduates, the mere mention of Room G03 conjures a very special memory. Not for the room itself, nor its desks, books or chalkboard, but rather for its renown and beloved occupant, Fr. Michael Dibble.

A teacher from 1964 to 1992 he was faculty in the English and Religion departments and moderator of the Drama Club. His popular classes and theatrical productions are often recounted by graduates as pinnacle high school memories. Yet, as those who called him teacher will agree, he was much, much more. Father Dibble was an enthusiastic educator with a passion for his pupils. He was profoundly influential in the emotional, intellectual and spiritual development of many students and colleagues. He



changed more than a few lives through his teaching, his advising and more broadly, his caring.
